Junior Preview Show is June 11-13 in Colfax

The Jasper County Fairgrounds in Colfax is the site of the 2021 Iowa Junior Hereford Association Summer Show, set for June 11-13. After the pandemic necessitated major changes to the 2020 show, the juniors hope to provide a more "normal" event this year, complete with numerous contests and competitions, a family meal and membership meeting.

Cattle may arrive after 3 p.m. on Friday, June 11, and must be in place by 9 a.m. Saturday, June 12. Showmanship competition will begin at 1 p.m. on Saturday, followed by the IJHA meeting 30 minutes afterwards. New officers and

directors will be elected at the meeting. Other Saturday activities include the illustrated speech, photo and poster contests and an evening family meal.

The preview show will begin at 9 a.m. on Sunday, June 13, with the crowning of the 2021-22 Iowa Hereford Queen and Princess. Show order is: bred and owned cow/calf, standard cow/calf, bulls, horned heifers, steers, polled heifers, final (supreme champion) drive.

A block of rooms has been reserved under Iowa Junior Hereford Association at the Comfort Inn in Altoona. **May 29** is the final day to claim a room in the block. Camping is available at the fairgrounds for \$15 per night, which includes water and electrical hookups with a shower house nearby.

Landt, Ogren Inducted into Hall of Fame

The highlight of the IHBA's annual banquet during the Iowa Beef Expo was the induction of two new members into the Iowa Hereford Hall of Fame, which honors people who have had a significant impact on the breed in the state. Rod Ogren of Marcus had previously been announced as an honoree; in a well-kept secret, Steve Landt of Union was surprised to be named a Hall of Famer as well.

Biographies of this year's honorees follow:

Steve Landt

Steve Landt has always loved the outdoors and working with animals. When he was old enough to join 4-H, it was a natural fit. A neighbor sold him his first Hereford calf and a lifelong love of Herefords began. He was a 9-year member of his local 4-H club, where he continued to show his horned Hereford cattle. His journey of raising registered horned Herefords officially began in 1980, when he started his cow-calf operation.

After high school graduation, Steve served on the Hardin County Extension Council and 4-H Youth Committee. He then became a club leader for the Union-Whitten Hustlers 4-H Club, a volunteer position he held for 27 years. He was inducted into the Iowa 4-H Hall of Fame in 2009 in recognition of his 30-plus years of service to the Iowa 4-H program.

Watching his two daughters get involved in the same club he grew up in was a special memory for Steve. When the girls decided they wanted to show cattle at the county and state fairs, he would take them out to the pasture and let them pick from a few calves he had raised. Now grown, both daughters still continue to show their Herefords at the Iowa State Fair.

Steve always encouraged members of his 4-H club, including his daughters, to be part of their community by volunteering and helping with community service projects, an activity he himself enjoys.

He has volunteered for several years at the Gammon Barn Museum during the Iowa State Fair and was instrumental in refurbishing the Gammon Barn Historical Site near St. Marys. Steve has been an active member of the Iowa Hereford Breeders Association (IHBA), serving several terms on the board of directors, which included stints as vice president and president. Since 2005, Steve has played an integral role on the IHBA's Expo Sale Committee and is currently its chairman. During his tenure, the Iowa Select Hereford Sale has become one of the top sales at the Iowa Beef Expo.

Steve cares deeply about Herefords and the people who care for them, especially the juniors. He and his wife, Jinny, put that passion into action from 2005-2008 as advisors for the Iowa Junior Hereford Association, mentoring numerous young people, many of whom continue to raise cattle as adults.

Raising Hereford cattle has become a family tradition for Steve and Jinny; daughters Erin and Adrienne; Adrienne's husband, Derek Kennedy, and daughters Jensyn and Emory. Five-year-old Jensyn is already showing interest in the cattle and wanting to be in the show ring. It's only a matter of time before Grandpa Steve will be taking her out to the pasture, like he did her mom, to pick out her show calves.

Rod Ogren (no photo available)

Fifty years ago in January, the Ogren family of Marcus, Iowa, exhibited the grand champion steer at the National Western Stock Show in Denver. At the halter of the purebred Hereford calf was 29-year-old Rod Ogren, who had not only selected the steer from Herman Family Hereford Ranch in western Nebraska, but had also picked out his maternal half-brother a year earlier for Rachel Doeschot, who had the Denver grand champion in 1970. Rod's eye for good cattle was evident even then and eventually led to a 35-year career as an esteemed international cattle judge.

Rod offered a couple of "fun facts" about that winning steer: He was purchased for just \$175; at the Denver show, he sold for \$10 a pound, totaling just under \$12,000. The calf didn't have a successful first outing – in the summer of 1970, the Ogrens showed him at the Iowa Hereford Show, where judge John Minish placed him last in class. It was John's son, Gary Minish, who slapped "Zero" as grand champion in Denver.

Rod is the oldest of Paul and Kathryn Ogren's five sons, all of whom grew up showing cattle, mostly Herefords, as 4-H projects at major shows in Iowa, Ak-Sar-Ben and the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago. Some of the family's foundation females were purchased with the proceeds of that Denver champion steer. That February, they competed for just the second time at the Iowa Hereford Show in Des Moines, where their 6-year-old registered herd garnered both the champion futurity bull and champion futurity female titles.

Rod went to work for Charlie Descheemaeker, a well-known Hereford breeder in Montana who had bred RC Mischief D4, a "game-changing" bull in the breed. A carload of junior bull calves out of RC Mischief D4 that Rod and his brothers fitted for Charlie was named grand champion pen of 15 bull calves in Denver and sold to major horned Hereford herds across the country at Descheemaeker's production sale that spring. The Ogren family themselves also exhibited carloads of bulls at Denver for several years.

One notable bull that the Ogren family purchased an interest in, Sir Arthur, became a Register of Merit show and carcass bull in the 1970's. He not only provided great genetics and national recognition to the Ogren herd, but a daughter was partially responsible for another segment of Rod's Hereford career. The family had a Sir Arthur daughter that won the Iowa State Fair and was to be shown at the American Hereford Association's Register of Merit Show at the American Royal in Kansas City. Rod went down to see that she was well taken care of (she was named grand champion female at the show). It just happened to be the same time as the AHA's annual meeting and Rod was approached to run for the national board.

He was somewhat reluctant because a friend of his from Iowa had also been asked to run, but decided to give it a try and was elected, becoming at the time the youngest board member ever on the board. During his 6-year tenure, the AHA's headquarters in downtown Kansas City (on Quality Hill) was completed. He also represented the United States at the World Hereford Conference in New Zealand.

Mentored by K-State's Dr. Miles McKee, Rod spent 35 years as a highly-sought-after cattle judge. His very first judging assignment was a 2-day show in Madison County in Winterset, Iowa, and while he would return there several times during his career, he went on to evaluate all breeds of cattle in more than 20 states and Canada. He judged many state fairs and most of the major livestock shows – Houston, Kansas City, Denver, Calgary, etc. When

the Iowa State Fair celebrated its sesquicentennial in 2004, the IHBA board deemed it fitting that Rod judge the open Hereford shows. He has also judged the Governor's Charity Steer Show at the Iowa State Fair.

The best advice he says Dr. McKee gave him early on was, "Don't forget about the kids." Those who have watched him judge or have shown under him will attest to the fact that he took those words to heart and had a great way working with the youth, especially first-time exhibitors. He made junior exhibitors feel good showing their animals regardless of their placing and has also advised many young people, helping them with their projects. Rod quit judging about 10 years ago because glaucoma and other eye conditions made it difficult to see the cattle.

Through the years, Rod has been involved with numerous livestock organizations, including Ak-Sar-Ben; the Marcus, Iowa, Fair; Cherokee County Cattlemen's Association; and Main Street Iowa. He continues to farm with two of his brothers, where they grow corn and soybeans and maintain a small herd of baldy cows.

Expo Events Successful

Despite a stretch of bone-chilling way-below-zero temperatures and the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, Hereford events at the 2021 Iowa Beef Expo in February were met with enthusiasm and good attendance.

The banquet moved to a new venue – a large and comfortable meeting room in the newly-remodeled 4-H Building on the State Fairgrounds – and approximately 100 people braved the weather to enjoy a catered meal, socialize, welcome two new members into the Hall of Fame and support the juniors' fundraising auction.

On sale day, the stands in the North Annex were full and bidding was solid. The 45 lots averaged \$3,727, which stood as the best breed average of the

week until the Maine Anjou sale with 10 lots and a \$40,000 female beat us out. Hereford bulls averaged \$4,068 and 28 females, which included one pick-of-the-calf crop, averaged \$3,520.

Herefords Compete in New Expo Events

The Iowa Beef Breeds Council initiated two new events during the Iowa Beef Expo on Friday afternoon/evening, Feb. 19. One was a futurity show for heifers purchased by juniors; the other a "Supreme Row" competition with each breed allowed to enter one female and one bull from its sale consignments.

Hereford entries in the Supreme Row competition were Double J's co-high-selling bull and a heifer, Blacks Dante 2012, consigned by Black Farms of Chariton, Iowa. She was purchased by Curtis Clark of Albia, Iowa, who also showed her in junior futurity show where she was reserve champion (to that aforementioned Maine Anjou heifer).

Changes in Store for 2021 Iowa State Fair Show

The Iowa State Fair (ISF) board recently announced that a full Iowa State Fair will take place this year. They will continue to follow all CDC and state requirements, which we all know can change at any time. It will be essential for all of us to be flexible and watch carefully for updates as the fair dates get closer.

Because of the ISF board's need to reduce expenses, the following changes will be implemented for all departments:

- Premiums will only be paid to the top 3 placings. This will be universal for all Livestock and Iowa Family Living entries. Rather than raise entry fees, the number of premium payouts were reduced. This will affect some exhibitors, but not all of them, and will not increase the out-of-pocket cost for exhibitors.
- Livestock entries will be made online only. About 80% of livestock entries are already submitted online. They realize there will be some exhibitors that will not like the change, and they will work with those exhibitors individually to meet their needs.
- Show programs will not be printed and distributed to reduce expenses by lowering paper expenses and print shop overtime. Additionally, this will reduce touch points due to COVID precautions. I will still get a few copies that are needed to run the show. Programs will be posted on the ISF website and available on the app for exhibitors and fairgoers as soon as they are finalized. They did use this process for the Special Edition show this last August and it was well received.
- The show will start at 9 a.m. this year and not at 8 as in the past. I did not request this change. We will still need to be moved out of the Stalling Barn by 7 p.m. on Thursday.


Ethan Heck from Chelsea is graduating from South Tama High School. He plans to continue his education at Kirkwood Community College, where he will study business.

Dear Hereford Breeder,

I am writing to you today regarding the Steer Futurity the Iowa Hereford Breeders Association sponsors at the Iowa State Fair. The Futurity was created to increase interest in 4-H members exhibiting Hereford steers at the state fair. To be eligible for the Futurity, the steer needs to be Iowa bred and nominated by an Iowa Hereford Breeders Association member. Since the inception of the Futurity, we have seen growth in the number of Hereford steers exhibited at the state fair. We went from the point of barely having enough steers to have our own class, to the past few years of having at least two classes of Hereford steers in the 4-H show. The feedback we have received from exhibitors, spectators and breeders has all been great, and we would like to do what we can do to keep the momentum going.

We pay out \$2,000 to the top five Hereford steers exhibited at the futurity, which is held at State Fair 4-H show. It is the intention to have this Futurity be self-funded by the nominated steers. The lowa Hereford Breeders Association does designate \$500 annually to the Futurity. However, we are coming up short with the nominating money covering the total of the payout. The reason why I am writing is to reach out to the breeders in the state for possible donations to keep the Futurity as it currently is and not reduce any of the payouts we currently have.

If you have an interest in donating towards the Steer Futurity, please send your donation to me or to Becky Simpson. I would ask that you write "Steer Futurity" in the comment portion of the check so we know the money is correctly allocated to the Futurity fund. Contributors will be recognized in the October newsletter. We greatly appreciate any support you could give towards this Futurity.
